

# **2022 Ends as Another Record Year for WFD**

2022 ended with the Waco Fire Department responding to 20,674 incidents which was a 4.2% increase over last year.

There were 291 structure fires that WFD responded to, with sadly, one recorded fire death. Emergency Medical assistance continues to dominate requests for services at 57% of the response totals. Incidents that dominated the headlines in 2022 included the "Kendall Fire" wildland urban interface incident in June, and the large fire at the Sunbright Recycling complex in October.


Non-incident related news produced a historic year for the Waco Fire Department as Fire Administration and Fire Station 6 opened in March to much fanfare and excitement. Almost immediately following the grand opening of the new facilities, a steady stream of firetrucks arrived in Waco during the next few months. New Engines for Stations 1,2,6,7, 9, and 11 along with a new Ladder Truck for Station 2 created excellent community engagement opportunities with "push-in" ceremonies held at each location.

Additionally, WFD took the main stage nationally, with new apparatus being displayed at the Texas Fire Chiefs Conference here in Waco in March, FDIC International Conference in Indianapolis in April, and Fire Rescue International Conference in San Antonio in August. Tens of thousands of firefighters had the opportunity to look over some of the innovative features of our new rigs!


# **NEW STATION 15 PROJECT COMING ALONG**

The design of Fire Station 15 at 10905 Panther Way has been ongoing for the past few months and is moving along nicely. To date a site plan, rough floorplan layout, and concepts for the exterior appearance have been discussed. Some features of the facility will include approximately 8200 sq. ft. of space, with individual dorm rooms, a small training room, and three apparatus bays. Construction will begin in 2023 and we look forward to its progress.



### **3 New Engines Ordered**

Three new Spartan fire engines have been ordered. The pre-construction design phase will be completed in January with WFD staff and engineers at the Spartan Motors plant in Brandon, SD. The order includes a new Engine 12, Engine 15 (for the new fire station), and a Rescue Pumper to replace Engine 5.

### **New Bauer Compressor**

In December, the City Council approved the purchase of a BAUER UNICUS 4i 18 E3 Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus ("SCBA") fill station compressor system for Fire Station 1. It should arrive within three months and allow the existing compressor at Station 1 to move to Station 11, replacing their 20-year-old unit. The system has many technology upgrades and will be a great asset to ensuring our SCBA filling capabilities remain intact for years to come.



### **TACTICAL TENDER GRANT**

On Thursday, December 15, 2022, the Waco Fire Department was notified that it was granted a Tactical Tender apparatus as part of the Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) grants program by the Texas A & M Forest Service. The grant program will allow WFD to take possession of a 100% funded apparatus for use at:



### **3 New Type VI Brush Trucks**

In November, the City was able to order three Type VI Brush Trucks at a cost of \$545,728. These units are much-needed to replace 23 year old units currently in the WFD fleet. A short list of some the features of the new units is below, along with a photo of a similarly equipped unit. Ford F-550 Diesel 4 x4 Super Cab

- · Larger wheels (335/80R20 MPT81)
- 400-gallon tank / 10 gallon Foam
- More storage
- Hypersight Thermal Imaging

The three WFD Brush Trucks had a combined 209 responses in 2022, which due to draught conditions most of the year, was significant compared to previous years.

- · Local and Regional Mutual Aid Incidents.
- Local/Regional Multiple Alarm Incidents.
- Emergency events threatening properties vital to National Defense, Critical Infrastructure or Important Military Installations.
- Local community events (parades, displays).
- · Training of firefighters.
- Standby for Cooperator's regular apparatus while out for repairs. Cooperator will notify TFS if the standby period is expected to exceed 90 days


Waco was one of only two departments receiving vehicles this year and this Tactical Tender will be one of only four state-wide. The Tactical Tender will boast a 2000-gallon water tank, foam system, and the ability to pump while moving. While its primary mission is to support and increase statewide wildland firefighting capabilities, it is a huge win for Waco, as the Waco Fire Department has no large capacity water hauling vehicles in its fleet.

The TIFMAS grant program has funded 54 (including two this year) apparatus statewide over the past 12 years. The Waco Fire Department has been an active participant in the TIFMAS program over the past few years with firefighters deploying to numerous wildfires, assisting with the COVID-19 response, and Hurricane Ida in Louisiana. Executive Deputy Chief Bergerson serves as a Division Coordinator managing resources in for 12 counties in the region.

The request to submit a TIFMAS grant was approved by the Waco City Council in October 0f 2020.

### 4th Quarter **Statistics**

The 4th quarter of 2022 proved to be a busy end to the year with multi alarm fires on October 10th at Sunbelt Recycling, an apartment fire at 917 Briar Dr. on October 23rd, and a large brush fire on Tom Ledbetter Rd. on Christmas Eve. On October 16th, WFD responded to assist Marlin and other agencies with a major structure fire in a commercial building in downtown Marlin. WFD assisted many other departments battling heavy fire, high winds, and frigid temperatures in the Gholson area at a fire that destroyed Café Homestead on December 23rd.
