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DEFINITIONS

Neighborhood Association

An independent, voluntary and informal organization that defines its own purpose and encompasses residents from a larger area to provide a conduit for information between the city and residents.

Homeowner's Association

A formal and mandatory membership group that governs common areas and rules for a subdivision.

Gauge interest and identify needs from neighborhoods




Survey conducted from Feb 22 – March 5


Key Questions

- Additional resources, supplies or guidance needed






SURVEY RESULTS: Grant Project Ideas



SURVEY RESULTS: Grant Match Capacity



Neighborhood associations were asked if they would be able to provide a match.

- Only 6 could provide a cash match
- None of those 6 could make the match with cash alone
- All indicated they could provide a match with combination of donations and volunteer work



NEIGHBORHOOD GRANT PROGRAM: Overview

Public Purpose

Financial assistance to neighborhood associations for beautification, identification, and community-based projects (public purpose)



25% Match

Cash, in-kind donations or volunteer hours

Match exemption: Public projects owned & maintained by City (street signs, park amenities, illegal dumping cameras, etc.)

Funding

Up to \$7,500 matching grant



Application

Open from April 21 – May 28, 2021

NEIGHBORHOOD GRANT PROGRAM: Potential Projects

- Events or gatherings
- Park amenities
- Security equipment to monitor illegal dumping
- Beautification projects
- Community gardens















- Neighborhood Identity
 - Create or redesign logo
 - New neighborhood signs or street sign toppers



NEIGHBORHOOD GRANT PROGRAM: Eligible Projects

- Support neighborhood goals
- Be highly visible and accessible from the public realm
- Have a community benefit
- Enlist community participation and support
- Result in an enhancement of the neighborhood
- Be feasible to complete within 6 months
- Be within Waco city limits



NEIGHBORHOOD GRANT PROGRAM: Projects Not Eligible

- Duplication or expansion of an existing program or service
- Ongoing services or support for operating budgets
- Projects that conflict with existing city policy
- Projects that conflict with neighborhood association goals
- Projects that could negatively affect the neighborhood or other neighborhoods
- Project exceeding six months to completion
- Maintenance of projects built with previous grants



NEIGHBORHOOD GRANT PROGRAM:Neighborhood Association Requirements

- Have by-laws governing the organization
- Have Articles of Incorporation filed with the Secretary of State
- Have membership open to all living within boundaries
- Have been actively holding meetings for the past year*
- Have a Federal Tax Identification Number
- Have a bank account
- Submit the application by the deadline
- Agree to submit the required reports
- A City of Waco Neighborhood Association

NEIGHBORHOOD GRANT PROGRAM: Funding Distribution


- Grant payments will be a reimbursement to neighborhoods or made directly to a vendor
- One grant limit in the year the NA receives their first grant
- Maximum grant amount \$7,500
