89th Texas Legislature Dates of Interest

- March 14, 2025: 60th day of legislature, bill filing deadline has passed
 - 6,600+ bills filed in House; 3,500+ bills filed in Senate
- Monday, May 12th: Last day for House Committees to Report bills
- Monday, June 2nd: Last day of Legislature

Governor Abbott:

- Property Tax Relief Tax and Debt Elections
- School Choice
- Teacher Pay
- Water Investments
- Expanding Career and Technology Training
- Bail Reform
- Texas Cyber Command



89th Texas Legislature State Legislative Priorities

Lt. Governor's Priorities:

- SB 2 Education Savings Accounts (passed Senate)
- SB 4 Increasing the homestead exemption to \$140,000 (passed Senate)
- SB 7 Increasing investments in Texas water supply
- SB 8 Requiring local law enforcement to assist federal deportation efforts (County level)
- SB 15 Removing barriers to affordable housing
- SB 19 Stopping taxpayer dollars for lobbyists



89th Texas Legislature State Legislative Priorities

State Budget:

- \$335 billion biennial budget: \$24 billion surplus + \$28 billion state stabilization fund
 - \$6.5 billion marked for property tax relief
 - \$2.5 billion for water
 - \$1 billion for education savings accounts

Bill Topics

Local Bills:

- HB 2626/SB 1194: Creation of the Central Texas Water Alliance, a water authority founded by Bell County, Bell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, the Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District, and McLennan County
 - Passed Senate; Pending in House Committee on Natural Resources
- HB 3693: Would add Waco to the list of eligible entities for the use of project finance zones
- HB 3830: Creation of franchise tax credit incentive for manure hauled out of the watershed

Local Defense:

 Source water protection – closely watching to ensure legislation is not filed this session that weakens the permitting structure in place to protect Lake Waco and the North Bosque River Watershed

Bills Impacting Cities

Property Taxes:

- \$250k exemption for appraised value of business personal property (HB 9)
- Voting requirements on debt and property tax elections(HB 5490, SB 2478)
- Increasing restrictions on no-new-revenue rate (SB 3026)

Debt:

- Move bond elections to November (HB 19, SB 533)
- Eliminate most COs and restrictions on GO debt issuance (HB 1453, SB 470)
- Waiting periods for debt issuance after a failed bond election (SB 1024)

Bills Impacting Cities

Land Use:

- Minimum lot size cap, allow Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) by right (HB 878, SB 15, SB 673)
- Limiting multifamily developments in single-family zoning districts (HB 369, HB 5514)
- Mixed- Use and Multifamily residential developments in certain areas (SB 840, HB 3404, SB 854, HB 3172)

Zoning:

- Zoning notice requirement changes (HB 2687, SB 1160)
- Protest threshold changes (HB 24, HB 1742, SB 844)
- Zoning challenges enforced by mandamus or injunctive relief (SB 2215)

Extra Territorial Jurisdiction (ETJ):

- No city regulations in the ETJ; No subdivision regulations or more stringent utility regulations in the ETJ (SB 1509, SB 2522)
- ETJ release changes (SB 2038)
- Fixes to SB 2038 from prior session (HB 1901, HB 2024, HB 2512)

Planning + Permitting:

- Impact Fees pre-notice requirements, supermajority vote, waiting periods (HB 2225, SB 1883)
- Remove ability to require certain number of parking spaces for new construction after 9/1/25 (HB 3275)
- Limits/Prohibitions on development moratoria (HB 2559, SB 1882, HB 5489)
- Third party review requests by developers (HB 23, SB 2354, HB 4677, SB 1450)
- Cleaning up Building Material Regulation Restriction from prior session (HB 3299)

(Dis)Annexation:

- Emergency Services District/City territory annexation (SB 1503, HB 3897, SB 2695)
- Disannexation of certain areas if city does not provide full municipal services (HB 950, HB 2494, SB 1844)

Public Safety:

- Local law enforcement (currently county-level) required to enter into agreement with ICE to enforce state and federal immigration (HB 2361, HB 2390)
- Uvalde Strong bill planning and response oversight requirements (HB 33, SB 2862)
- Drone purchase restrictions (HB 41)
- Civil Service collective bargaining (HB 3171, SB 777)

Preemption:

- Addition of Health and Safety Code to Super Preemption; preemption of cities on regulating elephants or any other dangerous/wild animal regulated by State statute (HB 5042)
- Addition of Election Code and Penal Codes to Super Preemption (HB 5203)
- Addition of subtitles within Local Government Code related to Land Use to Super Preemption (HB 5612)
- Preemption of local food service, health, food truck, and sound regulations (HB 2156, SB 1008, HB 2844, HB 2683)

Community Advocacy/Lobbying:

- No public funds for lobbyists or state nonprofit associations (SB 19, SB 1420, HB 571, HB 671, HB 3615)
- No public funds for lobbyists or state nonprofit associations (SB 239, HB 309, HB 1189, HB 1294)
- No public funds or other compensation to directly or indirectly influence legislation (SB 1695)

Elections:

- Elimination of May uniform election date (SB 1209)
- Ballot proposition language review by AG office or Secretary of State (HB 524, HB 631, SB 506)
- Ballot initiative petitions (SB 1548)

Utilities:

- Water infrastructure funding resource creation (SB 7, HB 4657)
- City to fund telecommunication line relocation costs imposed by city road projects (SB 2015, HB 4272)
- Utility revenue fund transfer to general fund prohibition (HB 4972)
- Cable and video streaming services (SB 924, HB 2479)

Open Government:

 Posting timelines, public comment, broadcast of open meetings on website, legislature attendance in closed session (HB 1522, HB 3850, SB 2485, SB 2424)

Freedom of Information:

- Public Information Act (PIA) applicability to publicly funded organizations (HB 111)
- ORR/PIA adjustments timelines, training, etc. (SB 824, SB 852, SB 919, SB 986, SB 1130)

City Administration:

- Licensed carry in leased city-owned property (HB 1715, SB 1065)
- City finance and economic development: destination sourcing for local sales tax, expenditure limits for cities, annual audit enforcement, 380 agreement reforms (HB 134, HB 5267, SB 1851, SB 878)
- Severance pay caps at 20 weeks (HB 762)
- Property owner nuisance claims and requests for reimbursement (SB 2489, HB 4943)

Fiscal Year 2026 Federal Appropriations

FY26 Federal Appropriations Process

FY25 Continuing Resolution Passed by Congress on 3/11/25:

- Avoided government shutdown, all FY25 earmarks were scrubbed
- Official guidance for FY26 process not yet issued have requests ready

Waco Requests:

- Waco Regional Air Traffic Control Tower \$5 million
 - Siting study and design needs
- Lake Waco Watershed Protection Program \$5 million
 - Request to prioritize existing federal appropriations for study and implementation of best management practices for phosphorus removal and reduction in the watershed
- Flat Creek Reuse Project \$5 million
 - Ongoing project, has received prior federal funding amounts
 - Diversion of treated effluent for non-potable uses in Waco's Industrial District
