





Waco 25th Street Corridor Study Waco Walks and Neighborhood Workshop #1

Draft Recap Document November 29, 2023

Introduction

The first Waco 25th Street Corridor Study Neighborhood Workshop was held on November 18th, 2023, from 10:30am – 12:00pm. The Open House occurred after the City hosted a Waco Walks event which took place nearby from 9:00am –10:30am. Over 40 residents participated in this walking tour and neighborhood workshop event. Workshop participants reviewed the corridor's existing conditions and were encouraged to leave feedback at several stations regarding the community's vision for the future of the corridor. An overview of the exhibits and the high-level takeaways are described in the following sections.

Waco Walks Notes

- On Nov.1945 the 25th Street movie theatre opened
- Provident Heights Elementary School dates back to 1904 in the Waco city directory
- Covered rest zones near intersections
- ADA standards incorporated throughout the corridor
- Owner of Tortilleria Bustos is a family owned and operated business. He indicated that parking could be improved and traffic speed was an issue
- Owner of La Nueva Michoacana has been operating since 2010 and moved to the area because it was welcoming
- Reducir a 2 carriles (Reduce 25th street to 2 lanes to reduce speeding)
- Comments from participant on a wheel chair:
 - o I have had to go on to the street to access the sidewalks and need support to navigate
 - Curb cuts to no where
 - o ADA ramps are needed
- Shade and greenway is needed
- More food trucks at Taqueria Santa Fe
- Space would be great for a playground
- Owner of Bertha's Bakery:
 - o Family owned and operated business for 30 years
 - Owns the entire corner
 - Has lived in Waco for 40 years and moved to the area because it is safe and the Fire
 Department presence adds security to the area
 - She envisions a park/open space to compliment restaurant and food stands on her property for the community to gather
- The corridor is a key connector that could also accommodate bike lanes
- This is the corridor of dreams. People have moved to the corridor and are realizing their dreams
- Trash cans and repaving everything to make it a walkable space
- Plants/trees other things that are aesthetic treatment. Make seating available along the corridor
 - Participants commented on larger old growth trees in neighborhoods that suddenly stopped and are non-existent along 25th Street.
- It is a street that is patched with tar and this makes it unpleasant especially in the summer.
 Need to fix the roads
- The street needs lights on both sides
- Uniform signage or standards so that the corridor look better
- Safe and modern intersection that incorporate audible crosswalks in both Spanish and English







- The corridor has lots of art opportunities, with murals to highlight the Hispanic established culture
- Ramps and sidewalks are needed. Too many existing sidewalks lead to no accessible crossings
- If you are in a wheel chair it is impossible to navigate
- There is lots of noise due to traffic and speeding
 - A participant commented on feeling unsafe at times walking on sidewalk as cars sped through.
- Gateway for the corridor needs to be; safe, welcoming/bienvenidos and noticeable.
- · A timeline to learn about the culture or history of the corridor
- The corridor is a gateway of prosperity
- Bring in businesses from other countries
- On walking neighborhood block (Morrow Avenue to 26th Street to Gorman Avenue)
 - Comment on gaps and uneven sidewalks from neighborhood into 25th Street made it difficult for individuals with strollers
- Owner of El Pueblo Boutique
 - o Started in La Pulga (Flea Market) by La Salle Avenue prior to moving to existing location
 - o Moved to 25th Street because of the economic potential and exposure.
 - Began with the Boutique to sell quinceñeras, proms, and sweet 16 dresses. Expanded and renovated the industrial space to host the complimentary quinceñeras, prom, and sweet 16 events.
- Waco Fire Station 6
 - Participants had many personal stories of visiting the historic 25th Street Theater and visiting shoe store on 25th street (assuming this is Paul's Shoe Service: http://wacohistoryproject.org/firstperson/paulconcilio.html)
- Where are the moments along the corridor for people to rest, sit, and have the ability to eat outside the restaurants
- Building facade grants should be available to assist in cleaning up the corridor
- Parking spaces are needed for businesses to flourish and be successful
- Participants recommended that team to look at historical 25th street photos from Gildersleeve

- 4. Work outside the project boundary: 7








Station 2: What You Love About the Corridor

Station 2 asked participants to write down the reasons they love the corridor and what brings them to the area.










- 1. Grocery store










Station 9: Visioning Comment Map








Station 10: Historical, Cultural, Architectural, and Natural Elements

PRIORITY TOPICS

<u>Priority 1: Constructing New Sidewalks</u> – Identify areas lacking connectivity and build new infill sidewalks that integrate with existing infrastructure.

<u>Priority 2: Rehabilitating Existing Sidewalks</u> – Address issues such as deterioration, uneven surfaces, and lack of accessibility to improve overall functionality and safety.

Priority 3: Public Art, Public Spaces, and Other Placemaking Elements – Invest in elements that enhance the identity and sense of community within the corridor such as public plazas, pocket parks, murals, or signage.

Priority 4: Installation of street furniture - Enhance the comfort, functionality, and aesthetic appeal of public spaces by investing in street furniture such as benches, trash receptacles, bike racks, and landscaping.

Priority 5: Installing Lighting Improvements – Improve the overall safety and aesthetics of the corridor by installing more lighting or replacing old structures.

Priority 6: Constructing New Pedestrian Crossing Infrastructure – Enhance safety for pedestrians by investing in infrastructure such as curb extensions, enhanced crosswalks, or pedestrian signals.

Priority 7: Traffic Improvements (such as speed limit reductions, new stop signs, new traffic lights, etc.) -Improve the corridor by investing in improvements to lessen the severity of accidents and congestion.

Priority 8: Constructing On-Street Parking Spaces -Improve the experience of businesses and customers on the corridor by constructing on-street parking.








Station 13: Comments and Questions
