

Nearly half of the zip codes in our county have low or very low child well-being scores, but those zip codes are home to 70% of children under six in McLennan County. As a result more than 14,000 children are living in communities with low or very low child well-being.


Creating a Child Well-being Community Action Plan which communicates a shared vision, unified goals and measurements, and a commitment to continuous improvement.


